## MLA CALGARY-ELBOW

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### DEAR CALGARY-ELBOW RESIDENTS,

Our government has been busy over the past month preparing and then introducing the budget on March 7, 2013. Budget 2013 proves our commitment to continuing to build our province, living within our means, and expanding our markets.

As a result of falling oil revenues, our government has been thoughtful in our approach and will prudently deliver on Albertans priorities as part of our long-term economic plan. We will invest in infrastructure and build for our future. Alberta continues to create jobs and attract thousands of new residents each year and our government will ensure that Alberta remains the best place to live.

# STANLEY PARK REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT

## Make Your Voice Heard...

Just a stone's throw across the river from East Elbow Park is one of the most diverse parks in the inner city. Playing fields and a swimming pool share this parkland with runners and nature lovers enjoying the natural areas of the park. In recent years, Stanley Park has become increasingly popular as a regional destination as well as a community park, damaging its fragile riverbanks and woodland trails and creating congestion in high use areas of the park.

The City of Calgary Parks Department has engaged Stantec to prepare a redevelopment plan for the park which is expected to be completed in August 2013. In consultation with stakeholder groups and the general public through workshops and on-line opportunities for comments and suggestions, this plan will help enhance park user experiences, improve the park's environmental health, and identify needed park facility upgrades and improvements.

Over the next few months, residents in Elbow Park and other nearby communities are invited to submit their comments on this project. Sounding Boards are also installed in the park for visitor comments.

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# SAFETY BULLETIN

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As summer nears, the following are a few short tips to improve the safety of community residents and reduce the risk of crime incidents in our community:

- Diligently remove all valuables from your parked vehicle and display an “all valuables removed” sign in your car - it’s difficult to deter thieves from prowling for valuables in vehicles, but the risk of incident can be significantly reduced. “All Valuables removed” Stickers/signs deter thieves and reduce the risk of vehicle break-in. Signs can be ordered for any resident members, to request a sign for your vehicle, please contact: [safety@elbowpark.com](mailto:safety@elbowpark.com).
- Be cognizant of school & playground zone speed limits – The spring & summer months tend to increase the number of pedestrians the community pathways and school zone crossings. Please adjust driving speed accordingly to reduce the risk implications of increased pedestrian. Try to limit any potential distractions in your vehicle when driving in or through the community this summer.
- Many home break-ins occur during the day and tend to increase in the summer months. Be sure to include home safety planning as part of your vacations plans this summer.
- Consider using “timed interior lighting” and installing motion sensors at the front and rear of your home/garage. Effective use of lighting can be a key tool to reduce the risk of home break-in & prowling.
- Ask trusted friends and neighbors to keep an eye on your home and pick up your mail/newspapers to reduce the perception of an unoccupied home.
- Valuables around a yard (bikes, sports equipment, tools) or visible through garage or home windows can increase the likelihood of theft. Make a conscious effort to cover up valuables and keep them safely out of view.

## SUMMER BOTTLE DRIVES

The safety committee plans to help coordinate the bottle drives throughout the summer again, please keep an eye out for the signs in the area for when the drives will be run. Reminder that the bottle drives are part of an initiative to keep recyclable bottles/cans out of the blue-bins. Cans/bottles placed in the blue bins for recycling was one of the contributing factors that led to an increase the number of bottle pickers in the Elbow Park area. Will need local community groups to help volunteer. Proceeds of the drives go to the participating volunteer groups. 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# ELBOW DRIVE ROAD RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT

## SPRING 2013 UPDATE

The majority of the construction work on Elbow Drive in the area from 4 Street S.W. to Sifton Boulevard is now finished. At the end of construction season in November, four lanes were opened to traffic along Elbow Drive. As is the case with most major road construction, any remaining clean-up work that is needed will be completed the following spring.

In the area from 4 Street S.W. to Sifton Boulevard, the following clean-up work will be done in the spring/summer of 2013. Timelines will be determined later in the winter and will be weather dependant.

- Landscaping completion, where needed.
- Minor curb repairs, as required.
- A few small areas of sidewalk replacement

## TOP LIFT PAVING

The first two phases of the Elbow Drive Trail Reconstruction Project between Glenmore Trail and Landsdowne Avenue were completed in the fall of 2011. The final step in any road construction project is to put down a top layer of pavement to smooth out any remaining unevenness caused by construction, utilities and road settlement.

Therefore, top lift paving from Glenmore Trail to Landsdowne Avenue is tentatively planned for this summer or fall, subject to an assessment of the road conditions. The paving will only take a few weeks and the work will be undertaken outside of peak travel times. When dates are determined, the information will be provided to the affected communities and signs will be posted.

Top lift paving for Elbow Drive between 4 Street S.W. to Sifton Boulevard will not take place until possibly the summer/fall of 2014 as per normal practice.

The City of Calgary would like to thank the community for their patience and understanding during the construction process. We understand that roadwork is an inconvenience for everyone. Every effort was made during construction to keep disruption to a minimum, maintain access and keep conditions safe for motorists, pedestrians and on-site workers.

Elbow Drive has been reconstructed under the Major Roads reconstruction program, a program dedicated to rebuilding the city's aging roadways. Elbow Drive was identified as a priority for this work and is the first roadway to benefit from this program. Because large volumes of traffic use this route every day, over time the underlying road structure had deteriorated and needed to be replaced. Other upgrades or replacements were also completed at the same time which included items such as: curbs, sidewalks, street lighting, underground utilities, and landscaping.

The reconstruction will ensure that Elbow Drive remains a safe and reliable link in Calgary's transportation network. Including the previous phases of the project, Elbow Drive has now been rebuilt from Glenmore Trail to 4 Street S.W. - a total of over 17 lane-kilometres of roadway. The work required 16 months of construction starting in fall of 2010 through to fall of 2012.

## POSTING TEMPORARY SIGNS

With the arrival of spring, Animal & Bylaw Services would like to remind Calgarians to consult the rules for posting temporary signs before placing them along city streets or in other public areas.

Complaints about temporary signs advertising everything from landscaping to garage sales tend to increase as the weather warms up. If illegally placed, they can cause a public safety concern by impeding the visibility of motorists and pedestrians. They can even cause traffic hazards.

Since May 2012, bylaw officers have taken down over 7,500 illegal signs.

There are proper areas and methods of legally placing signs. To be legal, the bylaw states that temporary signs must be:

- At least 30 metres away from an intersection.
- At least 10 metres away from a crosswalk.
- Two metres from the curb or edge of the road.

It is illegal to place signs:

- On a traffic island, centre median, or if the placement creates a potential traffic or pedestrian hazard.
- On a street light pole, traffic control device, fire hydrant, Plus 15 bridge or sound attenuation wall.
- By permanently affixing them or supporting them with string, rope, wire or metal stakes or if the placement causes damage to municipal property.
- That are larger than 0.6 square metres or 2X3 feet in size.

Calgarians are also reminded to be respectful and ensure that they are not placing signs on private property.

Temporary signs must list the name, address and phone number of the owner and date the sign was placed. The sign cannot be displayed for longer than 14 consecutive days or for more than 24 hours after the advertised event has ended.

Officers can impound any signs found in breach of the bylaw with a \$100 fine per sign. The Temporary Signs on Highways Bylaw 29M97 also includes a list of roadways where signs are prohibited or restricted. To read the bylaw, visit [calgary.ca/bylawservices](http://calgary.ca/bylawservices).

## FOSTERING SAFE COMMUNITIES...

*Street Smart Safety*

### RECREATION

Hockey nets, ski/snowboard/skateboard ramps and basketball nets are not permitted on City streets, even temporarily.

### OBSTRUCTION

Do not place electrical cords, hoses or chains over a sidewalk.

Do not place any material in lanes, streets, sidewalks or City right-of-ways.

### VEHICLES

Vehicles parked on driveways may not block sidewalks or boulevards.

Do not leave unregistered, uninsured vehicles on City streets or lanes.\*

A vehicle must be operable and moved within 72 hours or it may be considered abandoned and removed as such.\*

\*This regulation is a part of Alberta's Traffic Safety Act and is enforced by the Calgary Parking Authority

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### **ROADS SPRING CLEAN-UP**

The City's annual Spring Clean-up program is just around the corner. Spring Clean-up typically begins in mid or late-April and continues until just before Stampede rolls in.

Spring Clean-up removes the material that was placed on the roadways for Snow and Ice Control during the winter months. This road maintenance helps make our roads safer, protects the environment, and improves the appearance of city roads.

The accumulation of material expected to be picked up during Spring Clean-up this year would cover the playing field in McMahon Stadium with a pile of debris 12 feet deep!

Keeping Calgary clean is a collaborative effort. We are asking all Calgarians to help make the city a beautiful place to live by doing their part don't litter and move vehicles or carts from the street when sweeping is scheduled.

Sweeping of residential areas is done during the day (generally Monday – Thursday). Sweeping of major roads and commercial/industrial areas is done during the night (Sunday – Wednesday). ## **UPDATE: ESTABLISHED COMMUNITIES PROJECT**


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The City of Calgary Parks will be upgrading the Residents Association site on 8th Street SW as part of the Established Communities Open Space Upgrades project. These improvements are part of a three-year initiative (2012 to 2014) designed to improve and enhance existing green spaces within Calgary's older, established neighbourhoods.

Work will be completed in a number of short phases. For example, tree and shrub pruning may occur first, followed by other construction to complete the designed site improvements and finally, new tree planting in the fall. Work will be completed according to the approved plans discussed with your Community Association.

A construction start-up date is currently not available, as work depends on a number of factors such as weather, ground conditions, and contractor schedule. However, Parks will provide updates when information becomes available. All work is targeted for completion by fall 2013.


