

Safety Director

TO THE RESIDENTS OF ELBOW PARK,

I'm sure we are all feeling grateful for the improved weather after a very long winter! An unfortunate side effect of that improved weather seems to be an increase in car prowlings and similar incidents. We are also starting to hear reports of large gatherings in the parks, which, as we know from experience, can lead to damage to City and private property and danger from fires in natural areas.

Although Elbow Park and our surrounding communities continue to enjoy much lower crime rates than other parts of the City, there are steps we as a community can take to keep our neighbourhoods safe.

Be vigilant and report everything! The Calgary Police Service and the City of Calgary encourage residents to report all incidents, no matter how big or small. Making a report for a relatively minor crime can feel like a waste of time, especially if there is no missing or damaged property and the perpetrator is long gone. Such matters can feel like an annoyance, easily ignored. (Believe me, I know. I once had my wallet stolen out of my unlocked car. Thanks to a considerate neighbour I got the wallet back - minus the cash that was in it - and didn't bother reporting... I now realise that I should have called it in. I suspect I'm not alone!)

Reporting leads to accurate statistics, which helps the CPS allocate resources and patrols where they will be most effective. So...

- If you feel threatened, see a crime in progress, or see smoke from fires in the parks CALL 911
- Report car prowlings, suspicious activity, property damage, large crowds gathering near the parks, or noise complaints to the POLICE NON-EMERGENCY LINE AT 403-266-1234
- Report littering, broken glass, and property damage in the parks to the City at 311

The EPRA is in communication with our Community Resource Officer from the CPS and we pass on community observations and concerns to him. But that doesn't take the place of reporting crimes directly to the Police nonemergency line. If you encounter any problems when trying to make a report, please pass your experience on to us. Thank you for your help!

Flood Info

River flooding can occur at any time in Calgary with little or no warning because of the short, steep distance the rivers travel from the mountains to Calgary. The period between May 15 and July 15 is when Calgary is most likely to experience river flooding due to the combination of snow melt and heavy rainfall events. We actively monitor river, weather and snow pack conditions to prepare for potential flooding. It is important to note that:

The most important factor is heavy rainfall upstream of Calgary. These events are challenging to forecast, with Calgary in close proximity to the mountains. We can usually see large rain events about 5-7 days in advance, but we may only have 24 hours (or less) to prepare.

A high snowpack alone does not cause our rivers to flood. The snowpack in the mountains has been higher than average this year, however with the lower spring temperatures in the mountains, the snow is melting slower than on the prairies.

At this point, the long-term forecast indicates this spring will be cooler than normal with normal precipitation. The City and Province continuously monitor for conditions that can develop into flood events.

Since 2013, together with the Province, we have committed more than \$150 million towards projects that will reduce our risk of river flood damage. We have also strengthened our understanding of the flow of the Bow and Elbow Rivers, how rivers change, flood modelling, forecasting, preparedness and response.

While we have worked to reduce our risk of river flood damage, we cannot eliminate the risk of flooding entirely. River flooding impacts all Calgarians who live, work, commute or recreate in the city centre or along the Bow and Elbow Rivers. Citizens have a critical role to play in preparing for river flooding. Our 2018 Flood Readiness Campaign aims to educate Calgarians about how to understand their flood risk, be prepared and stay informed. Our campaign includes the following activities:

- Flood season campaign launch media availability (week of May 14)
- Digital advertising, promotion and social media
- Monthly City News blog posts (April July), calgarycitynews. com
- snowpack and flood risk
- personal preparedness
- mitigation projects
- climate change and flood risk
- Biweekly Flood e-newsletter (May to July), including promotion to increase subscribers (sign up at calgary.ca/floodinfo)
- Video series featuring residents who have taken actions to become flood resilient to be featured in biweekly flood e-newsletter and online
- Updates to flood website calgary.ca/floodinfo

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DEAR FRIENDS,

This month marks the fifth anniversary of the 2013 flood. As many of you are intimately aware, this disaster caused significant economic disruption, social impacts, and unprecedented damages. The road to recovery has seen both significant milestones and setbacks and I wish to acknowledge the leadership of the Calgary River Communities Action Group for their continued advocacy efforts.

Thank you to the many of you who attended last month's Special Edition Town Hall on Flood Mitigation and Preparedness, and a special thanks to the Elbow Park Residents' Association for hosting us. We know is that accurately predicting the large rainstorms that can cause flooding on Calgary's rivers is challenging because we are so close to the mountains. We may only have 12 hours to respond appropriately. Calgary is at its greatest risk of flooding from May 15 to July 15 and both The City and citizens need to be prepared to take action on what could be short notice.

My position is that this is not just a Ward 11 issue, but a city-wide issue. Calgary is a key economic engine for Alberta, and while the risk has been reduced, we remain vulnerable to flooding on both the Bow and Elbow. We have to keep pushing the provincial government to live up to its existing commitments, as well as start the work on new flood mitigation. If effects of climate change are considered, the urgency for additional flood mitigation infrastructure is even more apparent.

In great part because of what we've seen and done together, June is a great month to come together. I look forward to seeing you on Neighbour Day, Saturday, June 16 at one of the many events taking place in and around Ward 11. If you see me, please come up and say hello!

Just a reminder that your property tax bills are due on June 29. This is also a good time to consider enrolling in the Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP) which allows you to pay your property tax on a monthly basis versus a lump sum in June. For more information, please contact me or 311.

Finally, this month, please join me at my monthly Town Hall taking place from 7-8:30 pm on Tuesday, June 26 at Braeside Community Centre (110247 Braeside Drive SW). This will be the last Town Hall before summer, and we will resume again in September.

PIPELINE UPDATE

As I write this newsletter the Legislative Assembly has just passed Bill 12, which gives the province the power to limit oil and gas shipments to BC (or any other province). While my Alberta Party Caucus colleagues and I supported Bill 12, we had concerns about the tremendous power it grants the provincial government.

This is why we proposed and passed an amendment that added a sunset clause to the bill, which means it will expire in two years unless the Legislature chooses to extend it.

I believe Alberta should be prepared to use our new powers to send a message about how important our energy industry is to the economic, environmental and social wellbeing of our entire country. But this power should not exist forever.

By the time you read this Kinder Morgan's May 31st deadline will have come and gone. For the sake of our province, and for the sake of investor confidence in Canada as a whole, I want to see the company move ahead with the project. Exactly how this will play out is not clear at time of writing, so I will share with you my belief that large-scale projects like pipelines, even when there is substantial benefit to our province from their construction, are best undertaken by the private sector. The role of government is to provide a clear and consistent regulatory framework for those companies to operate in, and if all of the rules are followed, the project should proceed unencumbered.

But when one government chooses to ignore the rules, as the BC government has done, it is up to other levels of government to account for that risk. This is why I support the idea that government may be required to indemnify Kinder Morgan to ensure the pipeline expansion is built. If that means the federal government is required to purchase a stake, or even the entire project to see it through to completion, so be it.

While it's a shame it had to come to this, the Kinder Morgan Expansion project is too important to fail.

SPRINGBANK PROJECT UPDATE

I was very frustrated to learn about another delay for the Springbank off-stream reservoir project, which I believe resulted from unforced errors by this government. Their lack of understanding of the regulatory process led to filing the original paperwork much later than planned, and even further delays resulted from having to re-submit much of the documentation in response to questions from the regulator.

But make no mistake, Springbank is the right project to protect downtown Calgary, river communities like ours, businesses, and most importantly, human life.

It is critical, basic infrastructure that must be built.

I have empathy for the 20 landowners who will be required to sell their property to the province for fair market value. As much as I wish there was a better way to protect the lives and livelihoods of over a million Calgarians, there simply is not. Governments are sometimes forced to make difficult choices in the best interests of our province. This is one of those times.

I will continue pushing the provincial government to build Springbank as quickly as possible, and I encourage you to continue having your voice heard throughout the regulatory process, to the media and directly to government.
